

Way back in the mists of time, 1967 to be specific, Region 4 produced a highly professional magazine every six months. The copy that I have consists of fifty six pages of excellent material, including both professional and social aspects of what was happening around Wales.

Clearly the approach to producing the magazine was heavily dependent upon a considerable number of volunteer members who were holding various roles within the Region, such as the Travel Secretary, Social Secretary, Sports Secretary, Enrolment Officer. There was also a specific Children's page and a Woman's page. In addition, the magazine contained advertisements from various companies, social clubs and restaurants from across the whole of the Region.






Not forgetting that the Wales No 4 Region was part of what was then referred to as *The British Section*, members were also able to view the considerable range of quality IPA memorabilia items that were available for purchase from the headquarters IPA Shop.

I suspect that it is likely that many of our current members might well be scratching their heads in an effort to equate the old prices shown in the advert against todays form of currency.

Also note in Item 12, the old style of IPA Membership card that was then in use. It was of a linen type material and consisted of spaces on the reverse side where you could affix your photograph and signature. It also indicated your rank and Police Force. The back page consisted of spaces to stick with glue, your annual paper membership stamp that you received when renewing your annual fee. Sadly, I still have my card, dated 1st January 1973.

Finally, as we take this trip down memory lane, I will put my hands up and admit (even under caution), that upon leaving the RAF in early 1971, I initially joined the Metropolitan Police. I recently came across my original Conditions of Service of Policemen that I was served with upon taking the Oath.

I shudder when I look at the rates of pay back then. Be you a Met' Officer or from out in the 'Sticks', the pay was appalling, even with the additional Rent Allowance that married officers received. In addition to that, Police Regulations were strictly imposed, even down to seeking permission to get married – approval being granted only after a vetting of your intended spouse.

Certainly, things have changed through the years for the policeman's 'lot', some better, some not so good. But it was regarded then as a career for life, with a superb attitude of supporting for fellow officers, both professionally and socially, with the IPA playing an important part in that structure.

METROPOLITAN POLICE FORCE

CONDITIONS OF SERVICE OF POLICEMEN

1 The main conditions of service in the police are governed by the Police Acts, by the Police Regulations made by the Secretary of State under Section 33 of the Police Act, 1964, and by the Police Pensions Act, 1948, and the Police Pensions Regulations. The following paragraphs contain the more important conditions for the time being in force, stated in general terms for the guidance of candidates, and certain other conditions which every candidate must accept on appointment.

2 Pay.
For male constables under the age of 22 on appointment there is an age-pointed pay scale as follows:-

City of London and Metropolitan Forces

All other Forces

Except if there is a break in service, subsequent increments (of £40, £45 or £50) up to the normal maximum of the scale (£1,390 in London, £1,340 elsewhere) will become due on each successive birthday. An additional increment of £45 is granted immediately on the completion of two years' police service reckonable for pay. The normal maximum is reached at the age of 28; there is then a long-service increment of £40 at the age of 36, and a final increment of £40 at the age of 41, when the maximum of £1,470 in London, £1,420 elsewhere, is reached.

The scale for male constables aged 22 and over on appointment is initially £1,025 (£1,075 in London) rising after one year to £1,070 (£1,120 in London). After two years' service there is a double increment giving £1,150 (£1,200 in London). Thereafter annual increments bring the scale to the normal maximum of £1,340 (£1,390 in London) after six years' service. Subsequently, a constable aged 22 or over on appointment will receive two long service increments-£40 on the completion of 14 and £40 on the completion of 19 years of service giving a final maximum of £1,420 a year (£1,470 in London).

4 The scale for male sergeants is £1,505 a year (£1,555 in London), rising by two annual increments of £50 and £55 to £1,610 a year (£1,660 in London).

Beating The World


